

They met with old friends and new, enjoyed the fresh air, starry nights, warm days and stunning scenery, but best of all they came for excellent tuition, the chance to perform in large ensembles and small, and all came together for the end-of-camp concert. So why don't you come along to the January '25 Camp to clear the mind, enjoy a break and start the year on a high with a week or so of music making amid some of the most stunning alpine countryside Victoria has on offer. Don't hold back, just come along and become part of The Harrietville Experience!

The Camp begins at 5.30pm on Friday, 10 January and concludes after breakfast on Sunday, 19 January. 
